Painting for absolute beginners, in watercolor.

This class is for anyone who would like to learn the basics of how to paint, but doesn't have the schedule to do a 10-part weekly class, of for those who have painted many years ago and could use a refresher. I teach the class in watercolor but the first three parts translate just as well to all colored mediums (acrylic, oil, pastel and to a certain extent colored pencil).

This is an intensive 1-day class which runs approximately 9am-4:30pm with a short break for lunch (which you should bring). You will work hard and you will learn a lot. All materials are provided but you should wear clothing that you won't worry if you splash paint on. Watercolor is not an especially messy medium though, and this is not an especially messy class, and most paint smears will quickly wash out. Late teenagers and adults are the age range for the class. Small class size allows for plenty of individual attention.
